It is our first large gathering as a community post-COVID. Our chapter's very own Faythe Freese is a featured performer. The 2024 American Guild of Organists National Convention will soon convene in San Francisco on June 30-July 4. This is a source of renewal and inspiration for all of us. Being featured are some new young artists and composers along with the old guard. This is an opportunity for all of us to support one another through our attendance at inspiring concerts and wonderful educational workshops, to make new friends, and reconnect with folks we have not seen since the last national.

I am writing this article as a member of the Denver AGO chapter and as a member of your board. About three years ago, I was invited to be the featured performer on the evenings of July 1 and 2 at Grace Cathedral. I am



humbled by this extreme honor and very excited to share 90 minutes of fabulous music on a great instrument in a beautiful space. My programming assignment was to appeal to the serious, welltrained musician as well as to the general public. Why? Because on July 1, all of the AGO convention organists will be in attendance and on July 2 the concert will be open to the public. Therefore, my program must have broad appeal.

The program is to be presented in a multi-media format which includes organ in counterpoint with recorded whale song, seagulls, and ocean surf; and a recent commission by Pamela Decker entitled, The Freese Collection which was inspired by the Freese's art collection by the artist named "Nall," who is a protégé of Salvador Dali. The Freese will feature dancers. Collection with choreography by Kristin D'Addario, the Artistic Director at Los Gatos Ballet. A large screen will be provided to display whale and ocean scenes, the Nall artwork, and the performer.

Make every effort to attend the convention, you will not regret it. The barn-burner work by Guilmant/Middelschulte on my program is worth the price of admission alone!
