

Happy Fall. I am beginning to see signs of a resurgence in the world of organ music. Although signs may appear small, all put together we can count them a move in the right direction.

Just a few examples:

 Organ and church music academic programs are opening and re-opening.

- Our annual scholarship concert was excellent in many ways and, YES, there were more than 5K hits on YouTube.
- We have increasing members classified as young organists (under the age of thirty years of age.).
- Our chapter Young Organist Coordinator position is now filled by one of new Board members, Isaac Johnson.
- I am seeing an increase in organ concerts—both locally and nationally.

It is a HUGE goal to make a positive impact on an issue that many see as already decided. The issue I speak of is the decline of organ music. And yet, our young organists are fearless—trying out new repertoire and applying new skills to attract and retain



audiences. What fun to watch new trends!

SO, how can our chapter support this resurgence? Your local chapter has taken the first step. Our programs and learning never ceased during the pandemic. In fact, we continued and escalated the emphasis on skills building and broadening the diversity of our musical offerings, while struggling with the realities of the pandemic. For example, our program on women composers, which was written and directed by a chapter member, Dr. Lyn Loewi was also played nationally. Our programming has become more inclusive of under-represented groups.

The big question is how can a member like you help get the word out about the organ? The pieces are in place! We all know that seeing and hearing a pipe organ played well is not one bit forgettable. Our chapter has programming of excellent quality and diversity. We have excellent communication resources in place—website, (David Vogels, webmaster); our monthly newsletter, The Drawknob (Tom Strickland, editor); and a chapter Facebook page (Ben Ehrlich, administrator), and marketing efforts by Jon Busch and Jack Walsh. If we each use these resources and "get the word out," we can broaden our audiences. Attend as many events as you can. Many of our events have receptions, which is an excellent way to connect

with other organists. Help us publicize upcoming events—use your church announcements, tell your friends and colleagues. Use social media to share our announcements.

More awareness = More attendance.

Navigating the AGO National Website: Educational Advancement at Your Fingertips

Ah, websites. They can be confusing or enlightening. The AGO national website, www.agohq.org, is the latter, not the former. There is, however, so much material that it can be hard to navigate. Read across the tool bar at the top of the home page and you will find topics on Guild structure, chapter and membership information, competitions, new music, and yes, there is even a gift shop.

However, the focus of this article is on education, so let's take a look at what is found under Education.

The first dropdown deals with Webinars, Recitals and Workshops. If you missed the webinars the first time around, do not despair. They have been saved and are there for you to log onto anytime that you have a free moment. A sampling of topics listed include Certification, Organ Teaching and Technology.

Certification webinars include discussion on counterpoint, orchestration, transposition, fugue, and the new aural perception segment of the AAGO exam. Organ Teaching provides areas of group teaching, improvisation, literature, and Achievement Awards. Technology explains successful online streaming, virtual meeting options and Google, Skype, Zoom.

So, when you have a little downtime, cruise through the AGO national website, with an eye on Education.

St. Stephen's Episcopal, Aurora is seeking a Director of Music familiar with the Episcopal tradition to coordinate and expand its music program and direct its adult choir and bell choir. The Director of Music will select hymns and special music with the Rector, be responsible for the music budget, direct the choir during Sunday services and Thursday evening rehearsals and be responsible for instrumental musicians. The successful candidate will also develop a children's choir and assist in preparations for a second Sunday service beginning Fall 2024. Fundamental keyboard skills are desirable, along with choir and vocal training skills. Compensation: \$16,000-\$20,000 negotiable; consistent with experience and music budget.
