A Harpsichord Showcase: Bach and Beyond

We all know Johann Sebastian Bach as an incredible composer, but did you know that Bach was also apt to arrange (remix in modern terms) music from his peers from time to time? During the early 1730s, Bach was composing for weekly concerts for a society devoted to music, called the Collegium Musicum. In searching for inspiration for these weekly performances, he found a concerto by another famous composer, Antonio Vivaldi, that Vivaldi had composed for four violinists. Bach took Vivaldi's piece and arranged it to instead feature four harpsichords, creating one of the most famous harpsichord concertos today.



Bach's Concerto for Four Harpsichords is one of the pieces being performed at *A Harpsichord Showcase* presented with <u>Denver Rocky</u> <u>Mountain AGO</u> on April 14 and 19.

Cosponsored by Augustana Arts and featuring lead harpsichordist Jerimiah Otto, this program will include J. S. Bach's concerto for four harpsichords and a variety of other works by Bach, Couperin, Mozart, and Soler for harpsichords, organ, and strings, plus an original composition for four harpsichords by Otto. Harpsichordists Linda Mack, Mark Alan Filbert, Thomas Strickland, Aaron Hirsch, and Dr. Robert Hjelmstadwill also perform. An informal harpsichord walk-and-talk and a reception will follow the Augustana concert. Both concerts are free and open to the public. Donations will be accepted at the door for the Boulder program; reservations for the Denver program are requested through Augustana Arts (which has a Pay-What-You-Choose ticketing model).

Candidates for Chapter Election

N ext month you will receive a ballot for the Chapter election. Here is some information about the nominees.

Dean • Andrew Peters

Andrew Peters serves as director of music and organist at Augustana Lutheran Church in Denver. He previously worked for fourteen years at Second Presbyterian Church in St. Louis where he oversaw the restoration of the 1965



Schantz organ and founded the Couts Music Series. In addition to playing solo organ recitals and leading hymn festivals, Peters accompanies silent films starring Harold Lloyd. Since 2013 Peters has been ensemble organist with the St. Louis Symphony.

A recipient of numerous awards, Peters has received the Paul and Ruth Manz Organ and Church Music Award, the John Rodland Memorial Church Music Scholarship, and the Peter B. Knock Memorial Church Music Scholarship. He won first place in the Twin Cities American Guild of Organists (AGO) Young Artists Competition and second place in both the San Marino National Organ Competition and the Region VI AGO Young Artists Competition. He was also a Semifinalist in the National Young Artists Competition in Organ Performance.

As a member of the AGO, Peters serves as secretary for the Denver Rocky Mountain AGO executive board. He was previously program chair and dean of the Nashville AGO Chapter and later worked on the national AGO's Committee on the New Organist (CONO). In St. Louis he served on the chapter's executive committee, directed the 2010 Pipe Organ Encounter, and chaired the 2015 Region VI Convention.

A graduate of St. Olaf College and the Cleveland Institute of Music, Peters has studied organ and church music with Agnes Armstrong, Douglas Cleveland, Carla Edwards, John Ferguson, Wilma Jensen, Barbara and Noel Piercy, and Todd Wilson. He has served Episcopalian, Presbyterian, United Church of Christ, and United Methodist congregations in Connecticut, Minnesota, Missouri, Ohio, and Tennessee. His music is published by Augsburg Fortress, MorningStar Music, and Paraclete Press.

Sub-Dean • Linda Mack, SPC

Α native of California, Linda Mack grew up in the San Francisco Bay where area she formal began musical instruction at age six studying piano, organ, brass instruments, and, in college, the harpsichord. After



completing Bachelor and Master of Music degrees in organ performance from Andrews University in Berrien Springs, Michigan, Linda moved to Salt Lake City, Utah, where she expanded her career as a teacher, performer, and producer of a weekly radio program of organ music, *Te Deum Laudamus*. During her time in Utah, Linda served as Dean of the Salt Lake City Chapter of AGO and earned the Service Playing Certificate. She was a member of the local arrangements planning committee of a Regional Convention in Salt Lake City and was in charge of organizing the Competition.

In 1987, Linda completed a Master of Library Science degree from Brigham Young University and returned to Michigan joining the Andrews University Library Faculty as Music Librarian. Simultaneously she continued an active performing career, serving as keyboardist and program annotator for the Andrews University Orchestras, directing the university's Early Music Ensemble, and was music director for Episcopal churches in southwest Michigan. She was a founding member of the Southwest Michigan's Twin Cities Organ Concert Series, serving as member president. of the programming subcommittee, principal performer as organ/harpsichord soloist, organ accompanist, and singer, participating in nearly every aspect of the series, including publicity (contacts with print media, radio interviews, writing press releases), negotiating contracts, financial management, grant writing, etc.

In 2012 Linda's husband, Ed, took a position at Denver Health and Linda, Music Director/Organist at Christ Episcopal Church in Denver. She is currently singing in the St. Andrew's Episcopal Church Choir and the St. Martin's Festival Singers, and serves as a substitute organist around the Front Range. Since moving to Colorado Linda has been active on the board of the Denver Rocky Mountain Chapter of the American Guild of Organists, serving as Sub-Dean, publicity assistant, scholarship chair, and hospitality coordinator.

Registrar • Diane Gallagher, CAGO

Diane Gallagher has served as registrar for the DRMC the last two terms and looks forward to another term in which a new membership renewal software from National will be implemented. She has also served as



Dean and Registrar for the Denver Chapter in the past and Chairperson of the Hospitality Committee for the 1988 National Convention in Denver. AGO has been an important part of Diane's musical life dating back to becoming a member of the Kansas City Chapter at a time when a new member joined at the formal invitation/sponsorship of an active member.

Educationally, Diane received a Bachelor of Music Education at the University of Kansas where she studied with Dr. James Moeser. She continued organ study with Dr. John Ditto at the University of Missouri Conservatory in Kansas City. In the Denver area, Diane has served as organist in several churches including Wheat Ridge United Methodist and Trinity United Methodist. She presently serves as a substitute organist in various denominations and serves on the Board for the Colorado Bach Ensemble.

Since graduating from Knox, Liam has pursued a career in academic libraries and is currently the Library Collections Procurement & Processing Manager for the University of Denver Libraries.

Member • Barbara Hulac

Barbara Hulac is newly retired as the Associate Minister of Music and Organist at Montview Boulevard Presbyterian Church in Denver, Colorado. During her 40+ years of music ministry at Montview, Barbara



has collaborated with countless musicians and

ensembles. She has served as rehearsal accompanist and administrator for Montview's Westminster Choir.

A native of Pennsylvania, Barbara held her first church organist positions during her teenage years. She earned a bachelor's degree in Church Music with a Major in Organ Performance from Westminster Choir College, where she studied with Dr. Donald McDonald. Barbara has previously been organist at Our Savior's Lutheran Church and assistant organist at St. John's Cathedral, both in Denver.




Workshop at Augustana

Early Messiaen in Boulder

Saac Johnson will be performing a lecturerecital focusing on the earliest organ works of Olivier Messiaen on Monday, April 15, 5:00 pm, St John's Episcopal Church, 1419 Pine St., Boulder.



It is often assumed (and written) that Messiaen's modal systems emerged fully-formed from his

earliest works, including "Le banquet celeste." This research, however, shows how Messiaen's modes slowly developed, and inherited idioms from late-Romantic chromatic music, especially from those French composers who exerted a personal influence on the young Messiaen. The program will include discussion of "Le banquet céleste," "Apparition de l'église éternelle," and "Diptyque," with a focus on and full performance of the posthumously-discovered and published "Offrande au saint sacrament" and "Prélude pour orgue." Free and open to the public.

The two-part audition will include an assessment of the student's keyboard skills (two prepared piano pieces, one of which must be a *Two-part Invention* by Johann Sebastian Bach, a short sight-reading exercise, and two-octave major and minor scales in the keys of the audition pieces) and a brief interview to discern the student's level of interest in organ study, sincerity of purpose, and sense of vision.

Chapter members are needed to assist with every aspect of the program. If you have an interest in serving as an audition judge, helping with the orientation session, teaching summer organ lessons, or assisting with the final recital, please contact Mark for more information.
