Pedals, Pipes, and Pizza

Denver Rocky Mountain Chapter is hosting a Pedals, Pipes, and Pizza event for elementary and middle school-aged children on Saturday, April 22. Pedals, Pipes, and Pizza is a national outreach program of the American Guild of Organists, designed to introduce young children to the pipe organ.

The morning's activities will include a demonstration of the console layout and the sounds of the organ, a "Royal Tour" organ demonstrator by Randolph Currie played by Wellshire organist Wil Smith with a surprise guest narrator, and a chance for attendees to play a piano piece on the organ. There will be a special appearance by one of our 2022 summer organ scholarship students, Edward Nolen, who will play a few solos PLUS a duet with his dad, chapter member Charles Nolen.

Attendees will also receive a tote bag which will contain information about other AGO programs for young people, a copy of *The American Organist* magazine, and a small wooden organ pipe. The morning will conclude with everyone devouring (a lovely cheese) pizza.

If you have any wooden organ pipes that you would like to donate, please contact Denise Lanning (contact information below). We currently have 18 children enrolled and that number will likely grow.

Please include this information about Pedals, Pipes, and Pizza in your church newsletters and orders of worship. Print out copies of the attached publicity flyer for church bulletin boards and make additional copies for church members to pick up on Easter morning.



Messiaen Event



hree AGO events provided a rich experience March 11 and March 12, all occurring at Augustana Lutheran Church in Denver. On Saturday morning, David Vogels (former Dean of the Denver Rocky Mountain Chapter) gave a lecture-demonstration of Olivier Messiaen's monumental Livre du Saint Sacrement, and Sunday evening he gave a brilliant performance of this work accompanied by projected images showing the text quotations, birds, Gregorian chants, colors, and stained-glass windows that are woven into Messiaen's vast tapestry of sound. The explanation before and the images presented with the performance helped the listener comprehend the theological and musical messages contained in this vastly complex composition. David has been studying this piece intensively for several years, and this presentation and performance are truly a major accomplishment for him.

Saturday noon a luncheon commemorated the 25th anniversary of the AGO National Convention hosted by the Denver Chapter, and it was the occasion for an address by the AGO National President **Eileen Hunt**. She gave a short address on "Honoring Our Tradition—Embracing Our Future" which focused on the AGO Strategic Plan. It was also a time for renewing acquaintances (your Editor has known Eileen since about 1979) and to honor the hard work of those who put together a great convention a quarter century ago.

Free Pipe Organ

A scension Lutheran Church, Colorado Springs, offers an organ to be removed immediately. It is currently playing and available to play. Contact: Scott Christiansen <u>s.christiansen@ascensioncos.org</u> or 719-502-5978 (cell).

In good playing condition – only one dead note on main chest

16' pedal stop is digital and does not currently operate. It is thought that the sound module is inoperable. All audio equipment is included. Instrument built by local Colorado Springs builder in 1987 and moved to Ascension in 1992. Pipework is a mixture of historic and contemporary ranks.

Very suitable for a home installation. Bottom of chest to top of tallest pipe is less than 6 feet. Direct electric action operated by digital pipe control system of unknown manufacture.

Reed stop is on separate chest.

Swell shades with Peterson Swell motor. Blower and reservoir are in good condition. Multi-level combination action – 8 general. 4 divisional. Various other controls, all operate. Easily removed from church – no stairs. Organ does NOT include non-speaking façade pipes, case or console platform.

Pipework:

Flute: 85 pipes - Wood and Metal Principal: 73 pipes (tenor C) - Common bass from Flute Gamba: 49 pipes -Common bass from Flute Celeste: 49 pipes -Common bass from Flute Oboe: 73 pipes


Nominations in Process

The two-part audition will include an assessment of the student's keyboard skills (two prepared piano pieces, one of which must be a *Two-part Invention* by Johann Sebastian Bach, a short sight-reading exercise, and two-octave major and minor scales in the keys of the audition pieces) and a brief interview to discern the student's level of interest in organ study, sincerity of purpose, and sense of vision.

Chapter members are needed to assist with every aspect of the program. If you have an interest in serving as an audition judge, helping with the orientation session, teaching summer organ lessons, or assisting with the final recital, please contact Mark for more information.
